An emergency action timeline is a representation of what actions you should take when faced with typhoons, heavy rain, or other natural disasters. Research the level of risk of your surroundings and confirm where your nearest shelter is, when to evacuate and what you need to take with you.

### Let's consider a decentralized evacuation

Since a large number of people may gather at an evacuation center during a disaster, please consider the following points.

- (1) Consider establishing a safe place other than a shelter, such as a relative's or a friend's home.
- (2) If you are safe at home, consider sheltering in place at home (e.g., vertical evacuation to the second floor).

# **Types of Evacuation Sites**

◆Primary Evacuation Site: A location designated by a neighborhood association.

This is a gathering place (such as a community center or park) designated by each neighborhood association to confirm safety, count evacuees, and assess damage during a disaster.



Since primary evacuation sites are designated by neighborhood associations, they may be subject to change based on the association's decisions.

Secondary Evacuation Facility: An evacuation facility designated by the city.
 (designated evacuation shelter)

This facility is for disaster victims whose homes are damaged and uninhabitable, allowing them to evacuate for a relatively long period of time. Within the city, community centers, schools, gymnasiums, and similar facilities are designated as such.

This is an evacuation site for quickly escaping danger in the event a disaster occurs or is likely to occur.

There are cases where evacuation sites differ depending on the type of disaster, such as tsunamis, floods, or landslides, so please be aware when choosing where to evacuate.

◆ Voluntary Evacuation Shelter: An evacuation shelter designated by the city.

This is an evacuation shelter opened in advance when the approach of a typhoon or a forecast of prolonged heavy rain is expected to impact the city.

There are community centers or similar facilities designated as such in each district.

\*Notice of the opening of evacuation shelters will be provided via the government emergency radio system for disaster prevention and relief, Hakusan City email, the city's website, and other means. Please be sure to check if the shelter is open before evacuating.
